JUDGES - SALARIES PUBLIC ACT 78-1283 HOUSE BILL 2518

An Act to amend Sections 3, 3.1, 3.2 and 3.3 of "An Act concerning fees and salaries, and to classify the several counties of this State with reference thereto', approved March 29, 1872, as amended.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly: Section 1. Sections 3, 3.1, 3.2 and 3.3 of "An Act concerning fees and salaries, and to classify the several counties of this State with reference thereto", approved March 29, 1872,

as amended, are amended to read as follows:

Sec. 3. (S.H.A. ch. 53, s 3) Salaries of Judges of the Supreme Court

The salary of each judge of the Supreme Court shall be \$50,000 annually, to be paid out
of the State Treasury.

Sec. 3.1 (S.H.A. ch. 53, s 3.1) Salaries of Judges of the Appellate Court.

The salary of each judge of the Appellate Court shall be \$45,000 annually to be paid out of the State Treasury.

Sec. 3.2 (S.H.A. ch. 53 s 3.2) Salaries of Judges of the Circuit Court

Each judge of the Circuit Court shall receive and be paid out of the State Treasury an
annual salary of \$35,000. The judges of the Circuit Court in the Judicial Court constituted
by the First Judicial District and in other Judicial circuits composed of a single county
shall each be paid by the county in which their circuit lies an additional salary of \$7500
per year. Such additional salary shall be paid in installments by the County Clerk, at the
end of each half month, by drawing a warrant therefor in favor of each of the judges on the
County Treasurer who shall pay the same on presentation properly endorsed.

The judges of Circuit Courts, other than those of the Circuit Court in the Judicial Court constituted by the First Judicial District and those in any other Judicial circuit composed of a single county, shall each be paid out of the State Treasury an additional salary of \$7,500 per year.

The counties in each Judicial circuit, other than the Circuit Court in the Judicial Court constituted by the First Judicial District and any Judicial circuit composed of a single county, shall reimburse the State Treasury for each additional \$7,500 salary paid to judges of their Circuit Courts. The sums to be paid by the counties in each such circuit shall be computed by the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts and shall be apportioned among those counties in accordance with their respective populations compared with the total population of all counties within the same circuit. The population of each county shall be determined by the last federal census immediately preceding such reimbursement. Each county shall pay its portion of reimbursement not later than the last day of January in the year immediately following such additional salary payment by the State.

Sec. 3.3 (S.H.A. ch. 53 s 3.3) Salaries of Associate Judges of the Circuit Court

The salary of associate judges appointed by the several Circuit Courts shall be as follows:

(a) In Judicial Circuits other than the Judicial Circuit constituted by the First Judicial District, each associate judge shall be paid \$32,500 per year out of the State Treasury. In such judicial circuits which are composed of a single county, each associate judge shall be paid by the county in which such circuit lies an additional salary of \$4,500 per year. Such additional salary shall be paid in installments by the County Clerk, at the end of each half month, by drawing a warrant therefor in favor of each of the associate judges on the County Treasurer who shall pay the same on presentation properly endorsed.

(b) In the Judicial Circuit constituted by the First Judicial District, each associate judge shall be paid \$32,500 per year out of the State Treasury. In addition to this annual amount, each such associate judge shall be paid by the county in which such Circuit lies, an additional salary of \$4,500 per year. Such additional salary shall be paid in installments by the County Clerk, at the end of each half month, by drawing a warrant therefor in favor of each of the judges on the County Treasurer who shall pay the same on presentation properly endorsed..

Associate judges, other than those of the Circuit Court in the Judicial Court constituted by the First Judicial District and those in any other Judicial circuit composed of a single county, shall each be paid out of the State Treasury an additional salary of \$4,500 per year.

The counties in each Judicial circuit, other than the Circuit Court in the Judicial Court constituted by the First Judicial District and any Judicial circuit composed of a single county, shall reimburse the State Treasury for each additional \$4,500 salary paid to associate judges of their Circuit Courts. The sums to be paid by the counties in each such circuit shall be computed among those counties in accordance with their respective populations compared with the total population of all counties within the same circuit. The population of each county shall be determined by the last federal census immediately preceding such reimbursement. Each county shall pay its portion of reimbursement not later than the last day of January in the year immediately following such additional salary payment by the State.

Section 2. (S.H.A. ch. 53, s 3 note) This amendatory Act of 1974 takes effect on the first day of the month following that in which it becomes a law.

STAUNTON I MINE RECLAMATION PROJECT

INTRODUCTION

This proposal is submitted to the Illinois Abandoned Mined Land Reclamation Council and concerns reclamation of an abandoned mine site and holding pond near Staunton in Macoupin County, Illinois. This proposal discusses possible development plans for the site which could be implemented if reclamation is completed by the State. The development objectives proposed herein will provide a productive use for a large area which is now undeveloped and a source of pollution. Therefore, this proposal represents an application to the Abandoned Mined Land Reclamation Council for financial and technical assistance in reclamation efforts of the mine site.

The Spoil Area Map represents a general location map of the project area. The mine site is located northwest of Staunton adjacent to the City limits and is approximately one mile north west of the central business district of Staunton. The site is bounded on the west by the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad, on the east by a county road, and divided into three parcels by two county roads running east and west. Approximately 1/2 mile north of the project area is Illinois Route 4. This map also shows the extent of gob presently covering the site.

The Proposed Land Use Map represents the future proposed land use of the Staunton I Mine Reclamation Project which was determined through consultation with representatives of both the City of Staunton and Macoupin County to better serve the needs of the area.

PRESENT CONDITIONS

Land Ownership. Staunton I is the abandoned underground coal mine which was formerly owned by the Consolidated Coal Company and is known locally as mine #14. The mine ceased operation in the mid 1920's and has since been left to decay to its present condition. Today, the land in need of reclamation is owned by the City of Staunton and Tubular Steel, Incorporated.

Physical Conditions. The site is broken down into three parcels of land which are adjacent to each other but separated by the new and old coundy roads which cut through the property running east and west.

The main site is partially covered by a large, steep-sloped spoil pile which has been deeply incised by erosion. Mine dump fans out from the base of the pile and covers portions of the site to a depth of several feet. Concrete foundations which are remnants of structures used when the mine was in operation can be found in various locations across the main site; also, still standing is the concrete smoke stack.

Moving north from the main site is a small drainage area bound by the old and new county roads which has been covered with gob several feet thick.

Again moving northward from the new county road, the eroded waste has filled a holding pond with fine, slury-like gob.

Drainage Patterns. The majority of the runoff drainage from Staunton I flows northward towards Cahokia Creek. Tributaries on the mine property collect at the base of the spoil pile adjacent to the old county road where the acidic runoff passes through a concrete culvert beneath the old county road and flows into a deeply eroded drainage ditch which is covered with black gob washed from the spoil pile. Continuing north, the runoff passes through a corrugated metal culvert beneath the new county road and then into the holding pond area. The runoff leaves the northern side of the holding pond by flowing over the spillway and continues on into Cahokia Creek which is about 1/2 mile northward.

There is currently a proposal to create a large lake in the Cahokia Creek basin with the dam being located approximately one mile west of the Staunton I Project Site. The lake would provide residential, industrial, and recreational development plus a common regional water supply for the surrounding towns. An engineering study completed recently stated that this project could not materialize without first eliminating acidic pollutants from this abandoned coal mine draining into the affected water shed.

Surrounding Land Use. South of the reclamation site, the land uses are agricultural and wooded; also, south of the site are the sanitary sewer disposal ponds for the City of Staunton. West of the site are scattered plots of agriculture and wooded areas, the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad right of way, a small residential settlement along the old county road, and an auto salvage yard. North of the holding pond area, the land is wooded and east of the reclamation site, the land is primarily agricultural, with the exception of Tubular Steel, Inc., which owns an industrial site nearby.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS

General Description. The general concept for development of Staunton I is for the main site and holding pond area to become a regional year-round recreational center to serve Staunton and the surrounding communities. A portion of the site which has not been affected by mine waste has been designated industrial to provide for future expansion of Tubular Steel, Inc.

Main Site. Once the spoil pile has been regraded, this raised mound area will provide for picnic and playground facilities. To the west of the mound are proposed rest rooms, parking, and a baseball diamond. Surrounding these activities is heavy vegetation.

<u>Drainage Canal</u>. Located between the old and new county roads, this area will be partly filled and regraded. Provisions are made for bicycle and nature trails to allow access between the two sites, separated by heavy foilage and open space.

<u>Holding Pond</u>. A variety of recreational and athletic functions can be found on this site: tennis, playground, bicycle paths, nature trails, open space and picnic areas. An ice skating facility is shown which would provide open space in the summer and when flooded, skating in the winter. Parking is shown on the east and parking with rest rooms on the west.

SUMMARY

Completion of the Staunton I Mine Reclamation Project will serve the following needs:

- 1. Eliminate acid laden runoff pollutions from flowing into the Cahokia Creek water shed;
- 2. Provide excellent year-round athletic and recreational facilities for a regional area;
- 3. Provide for future industrial growth in the area;
- 4. Restore the aesthetic value and thus increase property values of adjoining lands; and
- 5. Create a healthy habitat for wild like in the area.

Implementation of the development plan is proposed to be accomplished through State of Illinois Reclamation Funds for reclamation of the mine dump, landscaping and drainage. A combination of local funding and HUD Community Development Assistance would develop the remainder of the facilities and the water and sewer developments.

State of Illinois assistance in reclamation of Staunton I will create a base for further development of this site into future productive uses for generations to come.

INTRODUCTION

This proposal is submitted to the Abandoned Mined Land Reclamation Council and concerns reclamation of an abandoned mine site near Staunton In Macoupin County, Ellinois. This proposal discusses possible development plans for the site which could be implemented if reclamation is completed by the State. The development objectives proposed herein will provide a productive use foe a large area which is now undeveloped and a source of pollution. Therefore, this proposal represents an application to the Abandoned Mined Land Reclamation Council for financial and technical assistance in reclamation efforts for the mine site.

General Location. The mine site is located approximately 1/2 mile northeast of the corporate limits, and approximately one mile from the central business district of Staunton. The project area is bound on the east by recently completed al55 and old US 66 and on the west by the Norfolk and Western Railroad which runs adjacent to the property.

Proposed Land Use Map. This map represents the future oproposed land use for the Staunton II Mine Reclamation Project, which was determined through consultation with representatives of both the City of Staunton and Macoupin County to better serve the needs of the area.

PRESENT CONDITIONS

Land Ownership. Staunton II is the abandoned underground coal mine operation which was formerly owned by the Consolidated Coal Company and is known locally as mine #7. The mine ceased operation in the early 1950's and has since been left to decay to its present condition. Today, the land in need of reclamation is owned by four interests: Ray Streeb, the Chicago and North Western Railroad, Excavating and Supply company, and Staunton Metal and Auto Salvage, Inc.

Physical Conditions. The site is broken down into two parcels of land separated by approximately 1/4 mile. The main site is covered by two distinct types of spoil piles. In the center of the property is a large steep-sloped pile which is surrounded to the north and east by one which is broader, flat-topped, and more shallow sloped. A portion of the gob has been covered over with earth removed from a road cut during the construction of 155. Gob has eroded from the piles and completely covered the reclamation site with fine, silty material to a depth of several feet. One fourth mile to the southwest of the main site is a shallow holding pond which has also filled with fine, eroded mine waste debris. Several abandoned brick and steel buildings still remain on themine site along with concrete foundations which were used to support other mine structures.

<u>Drainage Patterns</u>. The greater part of liquid waste from Staunton II normally flows northeast. Tributaries on the mine property collect at the base of the main pile adjacent to the Norfolk and Western Railway. At this collection point, the water is diverted through a concrete culvert beneath the railroad right-of-way and flows parallel to the tracks to a tributary of the Cahokia Creek water shed. When this culvert becomes blocked, the elevated railway roadbed acts as a dyke and channels the flow to the southwest into the holding pond and on into the City of Staunton.

There is currently a proposal to create a large lake in the Cahokia Creek basin with the dam being located northwest of Staunton. The lake would provide residential, industrial, and recreational development plus a common regional water supply for the surrounding towns. An engineering study completed recently stated that this project could not materialize without first eliminating acidic pollutants from this abandoned coal mine draining into the affected water shed.

<u>Surrounding Land Use</u>. Lands immediately adjacent to the reclamation area are agricultural with a small residnetial area east of the mine property. Directly west of the site is the Staunton Sportsman's Club Lake, which is presently polluted by runoff from Staunton II.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS

General Description. The general concept for development of Staunton II is for the main site to become a regional year-round recreational center to serve Staunton and the surrounding communities. It is proposed that the holding pond are to be returned to agricultural use to merge with adjacent land uses.

Main Site. The land south of the gob piles is flat and very adaptable to a variety of athletic and recreational activities. Baseball, tennis, a playground, and picnic area are shown on this portion of the map. West of the tennis courts, a shallow basin could be constructed which when flooded in the winter would serve as an ice skating facility. Parking and adjoining rest rooms are provided for also in this sector. Moving north from the parking lot, we find a toboggan run which is the site of the present steep-slope gob pile, regraded to provide a curved ramp, top and bottom holding areas, and a straight walkway. North of the toboggan run is the area now occupied by the flatter, shallow-sloped piles. Here we find a bicycle trail which continues on into Staunton, a nature trail which connects with the other recreational facilities on the site, heavy vegetation, and open space.

<u>Holding Pond</u>. South of the main site lies the holding pond which is proposed on the map as to be returned to agricultural use. The land surrounding the holding pond is presently utilized for agricultural purposes.

SUMMARY

Completion of the Staunton II Mine Reclamation Project will serve the following needs:

- 1. Eliminate acid laden runoff pollution flowing into the Cahokia Creek water shed;
- 2. Provide excellent year-round athletic and recreational facilities for a regional area;
- 3. Return polluted land to agricultural use;
- 4. Restore the aesthetic value and thus increase property value of adjoining lands; and
- 5. Create a healthy habitat for wildlife in the area.

Implementation of the development plan is proposed to be accomplished through State of Illinois Reclamation Funds for reclamation of the mine dump, landscaping and drainage. A combination of local funding and HUD Community Development assistance would develop the reamainder of the facilities and the water and sewer improvements.

State of Illinois assistance in reclamation of Staunton II will create a base for further development of this site into future productive uses for generations to come.

RESOLUTION

PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF A GRADE SEPARATION AND APPROACHES AT THE INTERSECTION OF ROUTE F.A.I. 55 AND RELOCATED C.H. 29 IN MACOUPIN COUNTY, ILLINOIS.

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois, acting through its Department of Transportation, hereinafter called the STATE, and the County of Macoupin, acting through its County Board, herein-after called the COUNTY, propose construction and maintenance of highway facilities as outlined herein, and

WHEREAS, the STATE proposes to separate the grades without access between Route F.A.I. 55 and Relocated C.H. 29 at this intersection, and

WHEREAS, the standards for construction of Route F.A.I. 55 do not permit intersections at-grade, and

WHEREAS, the standards and plans established by the State and approved by the COUNTY for the reconstruction of a highway of this type to include access road "A" in Macoupin County require that this improvement have an Aggregate Base Course, Type A and either 2" Bituminous Mixture Complete or A-3 treatment surface 20' wide on a 30' wide roadbed and an alignment adequate for 50 miles per hour, and require that access road "A" have an 8" Aggregate Base Course and Bituminous Traatment A-3 surface 18' wide on a 26' wide roadbed, and

WHEREAS, in order to provide continuity on Relocated C.H. 29 across Route F.A.I. 55 it is necessary in accordance with applicable standards to construct a grade separation structure and approaches carrying Relocated C.H. 29 over Route F.A.I. 55 as shown on the sketch attached hereto and made a part thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the STATE will participate in the improvement to the following extent provided the COUNTY will participate as provided in this Resolution:

- 1. The STATE will make the survey, obtain all necessary right-of-way, prepare plans and specifications, receive bids and award the contract or contracts, furnish engineering inspection during construction, and cause the improvement to be built to the standards set forth above in accordance with the plans, specifications, and contracts, and
- 2. The STATE will pay all construction, engineering, and right-of-way costs, and 3. Upon completion of the improvement and so long as Relocated C.H. 29 and access road "A" are used as a public highway, the STATE will maintain or cause to be maintained the grade-separation structure including its approach guradrail in its entirety insofar as preservation, repair and replacement is necessitated. Until such time that the STATE and COUNTY agree that a good growth of vegetation is established, the STATE will repair any appreciable slides or eroded areas on the slopes of the approaches to the grade separation structures. For a period of one year from date of project acceptance the STATE will repair any appreciable base or surface failures on the approach roadways attributable to design or construction.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that if said improvement is constructed as heretofore stated, the COUNTY will participate on the following basis:

1. Upon completion of the improvement and so long as Relocated C.H. 29 and access road "A" are used as a public highway, the COUNTY will Imaintain or cause to be maintained at its own cost and expense the relocated and reconstructed local road in its entirety which is understood to include the repairs and upkeep of all features of the improvement except the grade-separation structure and approach guradrail but including normal routine maintenance consistent with the policies and procedures of the COUNTY on the roadway surface of the grade-separation structure.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that approval of this Resolution by the STATE shall be considered as its concurrence in and acceptance of the terms contained herein and shall constitute an agreement between the COUNTY and the STATE for the maintenance of the improvement described herein, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk is hereby directed to transmit three copies of this Resolution to the Department of Transportation through its District or Regional office at 126 East Ash Street, S; ringfield, Illinois

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between the STATE OF ILLINOIS, acting by and through its Department of Transportation, hereinafter referred to as the "STATE", Party of the First Part, and the COUNTY OF MACOUPIN, State of Illinois, acting by and through its County Board, hereinafter referred to as the "COUNTY", Party of the Second Part, and the CHICAGO & NORTH WESTERN TRANSPORTATION CO., hereinafter referred to as the "COMPANY", Party of the Third Part,

WITNESSETH:

THAT, WHEREAS, Federal-aid Secondary Route No. 1741 extends across the COMPANY'S tracks at an existing grade crossing presently marked by a pair of railroad crossbuck signs, being located in Nilwood, in Macoupin County, Illinois, as shown on the map designated Exhibit A, which is appended hereto and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of public safety the parties hereto desire to protect the abovementioned grade crossing by the installation of flashing light signals, automatically controlled by track circuits, in lieu of the existing railroad crossbuck signs; and

WHEREAS, the proposed improvement shall be financed in part with funds made available by the Federal Highway Safety Act of 1973.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements as hereinafter contained the parties hereto agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The COMPANY shall prepare the detailed drawings, detailed circuit plans (including surveys and other engineering services), estimates of cost, and any required specifications for the flashing light signals and their operating circuits, and the expense for this work shall be chargeable to this improvement as hereinafter set forth. These detailed plans, estimates, and specifications shall be submitted to the STATE for their approval. No approved plan or specification shall be changed by the COMPANY without written permission from the authorized representatives of the other parties.

The completed flashing light signal installation shall conform to the STATE'S "Requirements for Railroad Highway Grade Crossing Protection, November 27, 1974" insofar as they apply.

SECTION 2 The parties hereto shall construct or cause to be constructed in substantial accordance with the approved plans and specifications, the following items of work:

COMPANY WITH 100% OF THE EXPENSE BORNE BY THE STATE AND COUNTY. shall furnish or cause to be furnished, in accordance with the stipulations and conditions of the Federal-Aid Highway Program Manual, Volume 1, Chapter 4, Section 3 issued April 25, 1975, insofar as it applies, all the labor, materials and work equipment required to perform and complete

- (a) the preparation of the detailed plans, estimates, and specifications for the flashing light signal installation as enumerated in Section 1 hereof.
- The complete assemblage and installation of automatic flashing light signals and their operating circuits.
- (c) Incidental work necessary to complete the items hereinabove specified.
- (d) The STATE and FHWA shall be afforded a reasonable opportunity to inspect materials recovered by the railroad prior to disposal by sale or scrap. This requirement will be satisfied by the railroad giving written notice, or oral notice with prompt written confirmation, to the STATE of the time and place where the materials will be available for inspection. The giving of notice is the responsibility of the railroad, and it may be held accountable for full value of materials disposed of without notice.

SECTION 3. The COMPANY, upon completion of its work shall submit to the STATE a detailed statement (in set of four) of its actual expense as incurred. After the STATE has checked the statement in collaboration with the COUNTY and has agreed with the COMPANY that the costs are reasonable and properly set up, insofar as it is able to ascertain, the STATE shall reimburse the COMPANY for ninety-five (95) per cent of the amount as billed; such reimbursement, however, to be subject to the provisions of Section 8 hereof. After the representatives of the STATE have audited the expenses as incurred by the COMPANY, including such items of expense as may have been suspended from the previous payment and final inspection of the installation has been made, the STATE shall reimburse the COMPANY for the retained amount and the suspended items of expense, less the deduction of any item, or items of expense found by the STATE representatives as not being eligible for reimbursement. After the final payment has been made to the COMPANY in accordance with the above requirements and stipulations, the COUNTY shall reimburse the STATE for 10% of the cost of the work. (See attachment for provision on pregressive billing).

The total estimated cost of the work is \$25,630 as set forth in the detailed estimate(s) dated March 1, 1976, attached hereto and made a part hereof. The estimated cost to the STATE and COUNTY is \$

SECTION 4. The flashing light signals should be placed in service immediately after the installation is completed, pending final inspection by representatives of the STATE, the COUNTY, and the Federal Highway Administration. The COMPANY shall notify the STATE of the date on chich the completed installation will be ready for final inspection.

SECTION 5. Upon completion of the improvement the COMPANY shall maintain at its expense the flashing light signals and their operating circuits, including the operation of such protective devices.

SECTION 6. THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between the STATE OF ILLINOIS, acting by and through its Department of Transportation, hereinafter referred to as the "STATE", Party of the First Part, and the COUNTY OF MACOUPIN, State of Illinois, acting by and through its County Board, hereinafter referred to as the "COUNTY", Party of the Second Part, and the BURLINGTON NORTHERN INC., hereinafter referred to as the "COMPANY", Party of the Third Part,

- (a) the preparation of the detailed plans, estimates, and specifications for the flashing light signal installation as enumerated in Section 1 hereof.
- (b) The complete assemblage and installation of automatic flashing light signals and their operating circuits.
 - (c) Incidental work necessary to complete the items hereinabove specified.
- (d) The STATE and FHWA shall be afforded a reasonable opportunity to inspect materials recovered by the railroad prior to disposal by sale or scrap. This requirement will be satisfied by the railroad kgiving written notice, or oral notice with prompt written confirmation, to the STATE of the time and place where the materials will be available for inspection. The giving of notice is the responsibility of the railroad, and it may be held accountable for full value of materials disposed of without notice.

SECTION 3 The COMPANY, upon completion of its work shall submit to the STATE a detailed statement (in set of four) of its actual expense as incurred.
