INVESTMENT POLICY

Investment Policy

It is always prudent for any public unit to have an Investment Policy in place for the purpose of safe guarding funds, equitably distributing the investments and maximizing income of the governmental unit. The following policy is adopted for the Macoupin County Treasurer's office.

Scope of Investment Policy

This Investment Policy applies to the investment activities of all funds under the jurisdiction of the Macoupin County Treasurer. This Investment Policy will also apply to any new funds or temporary funds placed under the jurisdiction of the Macoupin County Treasurer. The Illinois State Statutes will take precedence except where this policy is more restrictive wherein this policy will take precedence.

Objectives

The Purpose of this Investment Policy of the Macoupin County Treasurer is to establish cash management and investment guidelines for the stewardship of public funds under the jurisdiction of the Macoupin County Treasurer. The specific objectives of this investment policy will be as follows:

- 1. Safety of principal.
- 2. Diversity of investments to avoid unreasonable risks.
- 3. The portfolio shall remain sufficiently liquid to meet all operating costs which may be reasonably anticipated.
- 4. The highest interest rate available will always be the objective of this policy combined with safety of principal, which is left to the discretion of the Macoupin County Treasurer, which includes whether or not the Macoupin County Treasurer will require collateralization of any deposits.
- In maintaining its investment portfolio, the Macoupin County Treasurer shall avoid any transaction that might impair public confidence in the Macoupin County Treasurers office.
- The Macoupin County Treasurer will give consideration to the financial institutions positive community involvement when consideration is given to the financial institution to be used as a depository.
- All funds will be invested for a period of one day or longer, depending on the requirement for the disbursement of funds.
- 8. All funds shall be deposited within two working days at prevailing rates or better in accordance with Illinois State Statutes.

Responsibility

All investment of funds under the control of the Macoupin County Treasurer is the direct responsibility of the Macoupin County Treasurer. The Macoupin County Treasurer shall be responsible for all transactions and shall establish a system of controls of the activities of all subordinates who are directly involved in the assistance of such investment activities.

Accounting

All investment transactions shall be recorded by the Macoupin County Treasurer or the Macoupin County Treasurer's staff. A report will be generated, at least monthly, listing all active investments. This report will be made available to the Macoupin County Board and Macoupin County Treasurer.

Financial Institutions

The Macoupin County Treasurer will have the sole responsibility to select which financial institutions will be depositories for Macoupin County Treasurer funds.

The Macoupin County Treasurer will take into consideration security, size, location, condition, service, fees and the community relations involvement of the financial institution when choosing a financial institution.

At no time will the Macoupin County Treasurer investments exceed 65% of the financial institutions Capital and surplus.

All financial institutions having any type of financial relationships; deposits, investments, loans, etc. are required to provide a complete and current "Call Report" required by their appropriate regulatory authority each calendar quarter within 30 days of the "Call" request date.

Investment Vehicles

The Macoupin County Treasurer will use investments approved for governmental units as set forth in the most current issue of the Illinois Revised State Statutes including Securities Exchange Commission registered and AAA rated by Moody's and Standard & Poor's mutual funds consisting of U. S. Government Treasuries.

Collateral

It shall be the discretion of the Macoupin County Treasurer to determine whether or not collateral will be required of financial institutions receiving funds from the Macoupin County Treasurer. At all times the Macoupin County Treasurer will require that deposits in excess of 35% of the capital and surplus of a financial institution will be collateralized. The Macoupin County Treasurer may request collateral for any part of deposits in financial institutions when the Macoupin County Treasurer determines it to be in the best interests of safeguarding the funds on deposit.

When collateral is required, 110% of the deposit will be required. Only the following collateral will be accepted:

Obligations of Federal Agencies

Obligations of Federal Instrumentalities

Obligations of the State of Illinois

Obligations of the County of Macoupin

Obligations of municipalities located within the County of

subject to acceptance by the Macoupin County Treasurer

Acceptable Collateral as identified in the Illinois Revised State

Statutes for use by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois.

Investments shall be made with judgement and care, under circumstances then prevailing, which persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of their capital as well as the possible income to be derived.


The above standard is established as the standard for professional responsibility and shall be applied in the context of managing the Macoupin County Treasurer's portfolio.

Security Controls

Only the Macoupin County Treasurer should be authorized to establish financial accounts for the office of Macoupin County Treasurer. At all times either the Macoupin County Treasurer, singly or two, jointly, of two or more signatories as designated by the Macoupin County Treasurer should be authorized to sign on financial accounts of the office of the Macoupin County Treasurer. Authorized signatories should NOT be permitted to reconcile bank accounts at any time.

She welcomed all the attendees and commented on the large turn out. Since there were so many new faces, President Byots spent just a few minutes talking about the purpose of the Interagency Meeting. Individuals from various human service agencies, faith based organizations, and local government from across the county come together quarterly to share information on their services and programs. Each attendee is given a few minutes to address the group and briefly review their programs and services.

She informed the group of the two main programs offered at the Alternative Education Center. The GED Preparation Program provides programs for individuals ages 16 and over who are seeking their GED; and the Safe Schools Program which provides an alternate setting for at-risk youth.

Counties eligible for federal assistance to improve rural road safety

The Rural Safety Innovation Program was announced recently in the Federal Register and is a \$15 million program aimed at local rural road owners, including counties, who want federal assistance to improve rural road safety.

This program is an opportunity for local rural road owners to improve rural road safety through infrastructure and technological approaches using up to \$15 million in available funds. The Rural Safety Innovation Program is geared toward entities responsible for rural roads and highways such as counties, towns, townships and tribal governments partnering with the State Departments of Transportation to submit applications for rural safety projects.

Rural Safety Innovation Program

Over 3,000 counties and more than 16,000 towns and townships vary widely in their ability to design and implement safety countermeasures on rural roads. The goal of the Rural Safety Innovation Program is to improve rural road safety by

assisting rural communities in addressing highway safety problems and by providing rural communities the opportunity to compete for project funding to address these problems. The program will encourage States and rural communities to develop creative, locally crafted solutions to roadway safety problems, document their efforts and outcomes, and share the results with other communities across the country.

Through the Rural Safety Innovation Program, the Department aims to heighten awareness and interest in rural safety issues, and promote the benefits of rural safety countermeasures which can reduce rural crashes and fatalities nationwide. By providing technical assistance and best practice guidance from the program we will give States and rural road owners better tools to improve road safety in their communities.



- Improve safety on local and rural roads with innovative approaches in which rural communities develop and design local solutions to their roadway safety problems.
- Provide best practices and lessons learned on innovative safety technologies to assist local and rural road owners and operators in the development and implementation of infrastructure-based rural safety countermeasures that complement behavioral safety efforts.
- Promote national awareness and interest in addressing rural safety issues.
- Promote the use of Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) technologies to improve safety on rural roads.

Application Process

Applications must be received by April 14. Those applicants selected will be invited to submit more detailed project proposals. Renewable Energy Assistance

USDA announced it is accepting applications for FY 2008 to purchase renewable energy systems and make energy efficiency improvements for agriculture producers and rural small businesses in eligible rural areas. Funding will be available in the form of grants, guaranteed loans, and combined guaranteed loans and grant applications. For FY 2008 there is about \$15.9 million in funding for competitive grants and \$205 million in authority for guaranteed loans.

There will be two competitive grant cycles. The first deadline is **April 15, 2008**. Applications that are not funded in the first competition will automatically be considered under the second competition. Grant applications in the second cycle are due no later than **June 16, 2008**.

IDOT accepting applications for Transportation Enhancement Program

IDOT is now accepting applications for the Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP). Applications will be accepted for this competitive program until May 5, 2008. ITEP funded projects are designed to improve the quality of life in Illinois by promoting alternative transportation, such as bike/hike trails. ITEP is a reimbursable program that is funded by a 10 percent set aside of the federal Surface Transportation Program. Project sponsors may receive up to 80 percent reimbursement for project costs. The remaining 20 percent is the responsibility of the project sponsor.

In order to qualify for funding, a project must relate to surface transportation, and must qualify as one of 12 eligible activities listed below:

- · Pedestrian and bicycle facilities
- · Historic preservation
- · Rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities
- · Landscaping and scenic beautification
- · Scenic & historic highways scenic easements
- · Transportation museums
- · Outdoor advertising control
- · Safety education for pedestrians and bicyclists
- · Rails-to-trails corridor preservation
- · Archaeological planning and research
- · Mitigation for roadway runoff & wildlife connectivity
- · Scenic or historic highway programs

Any local government with taxing authority is eligible to apply. Local matching funds are required and work must begin on the projects within one year. Visit http://www.dot.il.gov/opp/itep.html to download an application form, or contact the Department via e-mail at itep@dot.il.gov.



Will County Receives Certified Local Government Grant

Will County has been selected to receive a Certified Local Government grant from federal funds made available through the state for local historic preservation projects. Communities that have achieve Certified Local Government status under the National Historic Preservation Act were encouraged to apply for \$92,263 in grant funds that are available this fiscal year through the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency. These federal funds are specifically earmarked for local grants in the areas of public preservation and development. Will County plans to conduct an intensive historic structures survey of rural properties in Joliet and Channahon townships with its \$20,000 grant. This is part of an ongoing project to survey and identify landmark structures in rural Will County.
