Robert DuVall, from Patrick Engineering, introduced representatives from Patrick Engineering: Chris Burger P.E., Vice President; Ron Swager and Dave Kramer. Patrick Engineering Inc. is seeking support from the Counties of Macoupin, Montgomery and Christian for an energy conservation education and assistance grant. If the application is successful, the grant will enable Patrick Engineering to provide certain energy efficiency services free of charge. A letter of support will in no way obligate the county to conduct any energy efficiency project, but will enable Patrick to provide these no-cost services:

### REPORT OF ROAD & BRIDGE COMMITTEE MEETING - FEBRUARY 3, 2009

PRESENT: Goodman, Novak, Pomatto, Schwallenstecker, Vojas, Wieseman, and Reinhart.

**PURPOSE OF THE MEETING:** Audit January claims and other business.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. at the Highway Department maintenance facility at 220 North Oak St.. An interested party has recently inquired about purchasing the property. The Committee examined the facility and surrounding grounds. The facility is currently used to store Highway Department equipment, rock salt, and traction aggregate. If the property is sold equivalent storage will be required at the Highway Department facility north of Carlinville. The meeting was adjourned to the Highway Department conference room. After some additional discussion the following motion was made:

MOTION: Made by Wieseman, seconded by Novak to have the Highway Department facility at 220 North Oak St., Carlinville appraised and have County Engineer Reinhart investigate the costs for a salt storage structure and an equipment storage structure. All in favor. Motion Carried.

Claims 6342 through 6377 totaling \$ 90,966.10 were read and approved.

The Committee reviewed the list of surplus equipment attached to these minutes and the following motion was made:

<u>MOTION:</u> Made by Novak, seconded by Pomatto to accept the list and approve the sale of the listed equipment at Konneker Brown's consignment auction. All in favor. Motion Carried.

Reinhart updated the Committee on the status of the Brighton-Bunker Hill Road project. The project development report and plans are proceeding but the Illinois Department of Transportation has indicated that they will not approve plans for the project at the current funding level. Efforts are being made by Chairman Manar to secure additional funding for the project. If additional funding for the entire project is not identified the project will still proceed but in multiple construction phases as funding permits.

Reinhart reported that FEMA is about to complete the paperwork on the Stagecoach Road culvert that was washed out in the heavy rains September 14, 2008.

Reinhart also reported that the Highway Department has ordered all of the rock salt it is allowed to under the state contract. The Highway Department has a small stockpile of salt on hand but it is probably not enough to make it through the rest of the winter. He is trying to indentify additional suppliers of salt.

The Committee was provided with a report comparing Motor Fuel Tax maintenance costs from the year 2008 to the year 2000. The report is attached to these minutes.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:20 a.m..

## Motor Fuel Tax Maintenance Cost Comparison

2008 vs. 2000 February 2, 2009

The Illinois Association of County Engineers (IACE) recently completed a statewide study comparing 2008 costs vs. 2000 costs for the predominant items of material/work bid as part of county and township annual Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) maintenance programs. The year 2000 was the base year chosen as it was the first complete maintenance season after local agencies began receiving an increase under the last capital program, "Illinois First". Analysis of the Macoupin County statistics along with the general results of the IACE study is presented below.

### County MFT

Macoupin County Highway Department's 2008 MFT maintenance program costs were 200% of its 2000 costs. Statewide, the average county's 2008 costs were 191% of their 2000 costs and individual counties ranged from 147% to 293% for the predominant items of Sealcoat, HMA and CMA (Cold-Mix Asphalt).

In the "For The Record" publication from IDOT, 2008 MFT Revenues statewide for counties were 110% of 2000 MFT Revenues (\$221,160,568 vs. \$200,432,250 respectively). This resulted directly in an over 42% reduction in the purchasing power of the statewide county MFT Revenue stream from 2000 to 2008. However, during this time, Macoupin County's 2008 MFT Revenues were only 96% of 2000 MFT Revenues (\$1,249,800 vs. \$1,299,713 respectively). This resulted directly in a 52% reduction in the purchasing power of Macoupin County's MFT Revenue stream from 2000 to 2008.

### Township MFT

The data for the townships is an average of common oil and aggregates used in Macoupin County. The townships average 2008 costs were 203% of their 2000 costs. Statewide, the average county's township 2008 costs were 189% of their 2000 costs and individual county's township costs ranged from 142% to 268% for the predominant items of Sealcoat, HMA and CMA (Cold-Mix Asphalt).

In the "For The Record" publication from IDOT, 2008 MFT Revenues statewide for township/unit roads were 110% of 2000 MFT Revenues (\$100,378,218 vs. \$90,970,250

respectively). This resulted directly in a 42% reduction in the purchasing power of the Township/Unit Road MFT Revenue stream from 2000 to 2008. However, during this time, Macoupin County's Township 2008 MFT Revenues were only 97% of 2000 MFT Revenues (\$1,557,220.75 vs. \$1,608,051.05 respectively). This resulted directly in a 52% reduction in the purchasing power of the Township/Unit Road MFT Revenue stream from 2000 to 2008.

### Summary

The information above can be summarized in one disconcerting statement. In 2008, Macoupin County and its Townships could only afford to perform 48% of the road maintenance they were able to perform in 2000.
